dan • ge r • ous: full of danger or risk; causing danger; perilous; risky; hazardous; unsafe; able or likely to cause severe physical/emotional injury and pain; unsafe; careless.

vi • o • lence: the use of force or the threat to use force that is likely to result in injury or death to people; the destruction of property; instilling fear of injury or death.

The impact and consequences of violence can often become commonplace in the lives of emergency care professionals. We can easily become complacent, if not immune, to violence, danger and evil in all of its forms in our personal or, even more importantly, professional lives.

"Active Shooter" (school, college, workplace, church, mall environments) and similar major incident situations will be presented in order to develop emergency responder knowledge and skills relative to "situational" awareness, strategies/tactics and best practices for staying safe and knowing what to do if you find yourself suddenly "in harms way."

Please join Dr. Roger Depue as he defines violence, its scope, forms, manifestations, prevalence, escalation, course and predictability. Dr. Depue will discuss both simple and complex precautions and principles associated with personal and professional safety as well as advanced concepts and tactics that can prevent violence. According to Dr. Depue, violence is often quite predictable if we pay close attention to and follow our instincts and intuition and stay tuned in to the scientific principles of prediction.

Dr. Roger Depue was the unit chief of the FBI's famed Behavioral Sciences Unit that consulted with author Thomas Harris on the book Red Dragon and on the movie Silence of the Lambs, which featured Jodie Foster and won five Academy Awards. He retired from the FBI after 21 years of service. He managed all FBI forensic behavioral science functions and personnel as well as training and research projects on the aberrant behavior of individuals and groups, and provided operational support during ongoing cases. He was a member of first FBI SWAT Team "Spider One". Dr. Depue's investigative experience includes organized crime, civil rights, fugitive, kidnapping, and extortion cases. Dr. Depue was also the CEO of The Academy Group Inc., an elite forensics think tank and behavioral sciences consulting firm. He is internationally recognized as an author and speaker on behavioral science topics. Virginia Gov. Tim Kaine appointed Dr. Depue to serve on the Virginia Tech Review Panel, which was formed to examine events leading up to the Virginia Tech campus shootings on April 16, 2007. This event resulted in the deaths of 32 students and faculty.

The program was developed to offer you a multi-disciplined, up-close view of today's pediatric focal points and includes an entertaining lecture as well as applicable case study evaluations. **Precious Cargo** is spiced with reality and blended with the facts you and your little patient needs for that positive outcome. Upon completion of this presentation, the participant should be able to identify the primary mechanisms of injury and illness, discuss and be able to relate injury and illness patterns to selected age groups, discuss pediatric call preparation and emergent assessment, describe the principles of airway management and motion restriction, and discuss shock and resuscitation as it relates to the most common pediatric emergencies.

"Scotty" Bolleter is a well-respected Flight Paramedic and internationally recognized speaker. He is best known in emergency medicine for his inspiring lectures, moving poetry and from-the-heart speaking style. He is currently director of education for San Antonio AirLife, where he focuses on education, process improvement and research. Scotty's publications, presentations and accomplishments are extensive, with his work found in magazines, journals, textbooks and videos throughout emergency medicine. When asked about his career, Scotty is quick to reply that it "pales in comparison to the sacrifices made by those who protect our liberty and the lives of those who continue to refine the art of medicine."

Join **FBI** Special Agent Greg Winsor as he discusses the latest advances in the provision of tactical emergency care and the provision of tactical and operational medical support for high-risk law enforcement and special operations. SA Winsor will discuss how local EMS systems may support and integrate with law enforcement for these tactical/operational medical missions. The elements of tactical mission planning, integration and coordination of these plans with local/regional EMS systems and ambulance agencies as well as with fire/rescue, hazmat, local hospitals and trauma centers will be emphasized.

SA Winsor is operational medicine coordinator with the **FBI's** National Capital Response Squad based in Washington D.C. He is an advanced capability paramedic and leads the **FBI's** medical planning efforts for tactical and other high-risk law enforcement operations in the Washington area. He has served as a certified NREMT-Paramedic, an intensive care unit registered nurse and a flight nurse with Boston MedFlight. In 2009, he received the **FBI** Director's Award for Distinguished Service to the law enforcement community.

BATTLEFIELD EMERGENCY CARE -- LESSONS LEARNED IN BAGHDAD

Lt. Col. John Groves, RN, MSN, Clinical Nurse Specialist -- Trauma
United States Army

Join trauma clinical nurse specialist Lt. Col. John Groves as he translates lessons learned on the Iraq battlefield to contemporary civilian trauma systems and trauma center care. Lt. Col. Groves will discuss key concepts and skills in trauma team member training and development. He took a group of soldiers with less than a years experience to the front lines in Baghdad. His trauma team achieved over a 94% survivability rate. He will share how, through building amazing teams, they achieved such success. Learn how the 10th Combat Support Hospital achieved this survival rate, how they treated over 7,000 patients, managed 12 MASCAL's, and 109 successful MedEvac flights in just one year. He will help us all remember why ours is the best job in the world...because of who we are taking care of.

Lt. Col. John Groves completed a year-long tour of duty with the support hospital in Iraq as the emergency department head nurse. The emergency care delivered there was featured in National Geographic in December 2006, and on CNN in the documentary "Combat Hospital". He has over 20 years of clinical, educational and managerial experience. His clinical experience includes trauma and emergency care. In addition, he served as course director and instructor of the Army's elite Special Operations Medical Sergeants' Course. In 2001, he was hand-selected to be the first directorate of trauma for the Army Trauma Training Center, a congressionally mandated military and civilian partnership with the Ryder Trauma Center located at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami where he trained forward surgical teams to provide care for wounded soldiers near the battle. He has published his team's experience in several articles, including the Advanced Emergency Journal of Nursing. In 2008, he was named Manager of the Year by the ENA. Lt. Col. Groves's education includes a bachelor's degree from Indiana University and a master's in nursing from the University of Kentucky.

RESILIENCY, HEROES AND HEALING

In order to provide amazing or extraordinary care to our patients (often heroes themselves), how do we develop, nurture and enrich ourselves and our own "healing skills" (physical, emotional and spiritual) to create a healing environment and experience for each patient?

Resiliency is the capacity to withstand life's stressors (personal and professional) and tragedies, and to thrive, grow and find meaning from these challenges and events. This presentation will illustrate and discuss tragic events often encountered by emergency professionals that can test the limits of the human psyche. Resiliency education has become a top priority for the Department of Defense, specifically the Army, given the continued stresses placed on our troops with being at war for so long. First-person accounts of tragedies in a war time setting will be used to describe how emergency professionals negatively impacted by such events outside of their control can overcome and bounce back as stronger, more resilient and even more compassionate and confident emergency professionals.

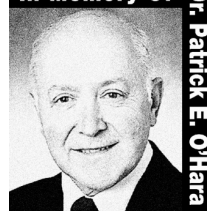
